

Dear friends,

This past week we celebrated the Fourth of July, our nation's Independence Day. For many, it was a day off from work, a holiday. For retailers and store owners, it was a "Fourth of July Sale." There were back yard BBQ's, family gatherings with friends. For others, it was "business as usual," having to punch the clock and be on time for work. As night fell, the day ended with an incredible display of fireworks, "The largest fireworks in the State!" "Let freedom ring" is the foundational spirit and chant of the day.

But in the reflective quiet of my celebration of Independence Day, I found myself torn because of the reality of at least two Americas. One in which relative freedom has been achieved and another America where people of this nation are struggling to really be free. Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King once said that, "No one is free until all people are free."

Inequality has been a big theme in the U.S. of late. The stats are stark. Police stops, brutality and the incarceration rates among African Americans are astronomical, hate crimes and workplace discomfort are still very real concerns. Women still face threats of violence and lower earnings because of their gender. People with disabilities, Hispanics, Immigrants, Refugees, American Indians, People from differing religious backgrounds, various nationalities and marriage partners all have their own painful struggles for freedom as well. The following day, July 5th marked the 2 year anniversary of the police shooting of Alton Sterling and while some things have changed, like the new policy on use of force for the BRPD, relatively little has ultimately changed.

Clearly, as Christians, we have much to do so that all people are free. But so many times, I hear, "How can I do anything that matters in the long run?"

We cannot forget that when the power of Jesus Christ combines with an undying sense of hope and a belief unrestrained by our fear of rejection, extraordinary things happen that astound the world. For example: On September 20, 1989, in Pretoria, South Africa, F. W. de Klerk was inaugurated as President of the country. Apartheid, the legal segregation of the races, was the law of the land. de Klerk was a Christian who attended church regularly, so he invited his favorite pastor, a white man named Peter Bingle, to lead a worship service as part of the inaugural events.

During the sermon, Pastor Bingle said this: Mr. de Klerk, as our new President, God is calling you to do his will. Today God calls you to serve as the President of South Africa. God's commission is not to serve as the President of some people, but as the President of all the people of South Africa.

By the benediction, de Klerk was weeping. He called his family and friends together and said, "Pray for me. God has told me what I must do. And if I do it, I will be rejected by my own people. Pray for me, that I might do the will of God."

Soon thereafter, de Klerk took steps to release Nelson Mandela from prison. Then he began to negotiate with the African National Congress. Then he worked to dismantle the system of apartheid. The rest, as they say, is history.

Dear brothers and sisters, the hometown folks are a tough crowd, but how long will we let our unbelief, our fear of rejection, our lack of hope keep us from the astounding deeds of power that Jesus longs to accomplish in our lives? Let no stumbling block be too big for us to overcome until that day when real freedom rings!
