Coronavirus - COVID-19

The coronavirus [2019-nCoV] is a new type of coronavirus that was first diagnosed in Wuhan, China. It causes respiratory illness in people affected by it. Unfortunately, there is currently no vaccine available.

- COVID-19 can spread from person to person. This usually happens through respiratory droplets when someone with the virus coughs or sneezes and you breathe it in. Most often, you need to be close within 6 feet of the person for it to spread this way.
- It is possible to get the virus by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching your own mouth, nose or your eyes before washing your hands.
- COVID-19 can cause respiratory illness ranging from mild to severe or even deadly. The symptoms usually start 2-14 days after you get infected. They include fever, headache, runny nose, sore throat, cough, and shortness of breath. Severe infections are more common in people with weakened immune systems.
- Anyone can get the coronavirus.






- To reduce your risk of getting or spreading the coronavirus, wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- Avoid touching your face, mouth, nose, or eyes with unwashed hands.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces you frequently touch.
- Cough and sneeze into the fold of your elbow or tissue, then throw away the tissue and wash your hands.
- Do not share dishes, drinking glasses, utensils or towels with anyone.
- Avoid close contact with people, practice social distancing by staying 6 feet apart.
- Drink plenty of fluids and get plenty of rest.
- Stay home if you are sick.
